Introduction

The findings of a recent study showed that there is a significant benefit to students who participate in out-of-school-time (OST) programs. In fact, the Return on Investment of Summer school Programs in Pennsylvania study determined that for every dollar invested in summer school programming for students there was a return of \$6.69 in potential benefits to students, including reduced rates for dropouts, teen pregnancy, substance abuse, crime and delinquency (Link PSAYDN.org).

In accordance with the American Rescue Plan (ARP) Act and Pennsylvania Act 24 of 2021 (Act 24), the Pennsylvania Department of Education (PDE) will award approximately \$50,000,000 or one percent (1%) of Pennsylvania's ARP Elementary and Secondary School Education Relief (ESSER) State Reserve funds to support school districts, charter schools and cyber charter schools (collectively, LEAs) in the development and implementation of comprehensive after-school programs to address learning loss in response to the academic, social, emotional and mental health needs of students and subgroups of students impacted by COVID-19 public health emergency that supplement school programs and activities.

Act 24 requires that, when available, existing personnel shall be utilized by school districts, charter schools and cyber charter schools to staff programs and activities established with these grant funds.

Within 90 days of receipt of these allocations, school districts, charter schools and cyber charter schools must submit a three- part plan to PDE, that outlines the proposed use of the grant money, itemized by program and activity. This plan is part of a consolidated application that includes after-school programming, summer programming, and a comprehensive plan to address learning loss. The plan shall include:

- 1) A description of each program and activity
- 2) A narrative outlining the expected benefit of each program and activity
- 3) A budget for each program and activity detailing personnel and operating costs

Indicators of Impact

 Describe how the LEA identified students for inclusion in a summer school program. Include a brief description of the indicators used in the decision-making process.

Elizabeth Forward School District will run a Pre-K and Kindergarten Summer Program for the next three summers. The summer program will run for 5-weeks and consist of an EF teacher and an instructional aide in each classroom. Pre-K students will be screened in May of each

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year and targeted students will be selected from the screening tool rubric to participate in the summer program. A team of educators have created a rubric for students to be selected into the summer program. The screening tool is also used at the end of the summer program to show how much progress the students made in the program. The current kindergarten students will be evaluated three times using the NWEA Map Assessment throughout the school year. Principals review the NWEA Map Assessment data and work with each kindergarten teacher to select students who need extra help. Principals then meet with the parents of the selected students to review the data and discuss the summer program. One of the major barriers in summer programs is transportation. These funds will help offset the transportation costs for the summer program.

Research estimates that students typically decline one month worth of school year learning over the summer vacation. This learning loss was found to be higher in lower-income students. The program proposed by this grant would address the needs of our youngest learners, incoming grades Kindergarten and 1. The focus would be on addressing fundamental skill deficits that would impact these students in future grades. The students are identified using the district designed screening tool and NWEA MAP Growth data. To guarantee that all students have access to this program, the district will provide transportation.
